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Our Mission

ProActive Management Counseling and Advocacy Services staff aims to strengthen families by conducting Comprehensive Child and Family Assessments that identify strengths, assess needs and provides information to develop a plan for family success.



Changing lives... One family at a time.

The Comprehensive Child and Family Assessment (CCFA) consists of:

Family Assessment: The family assessment is the foundation of the family case plan. The goal is to provide comprehensive information about the family's overall functioning. Through the assessment process, parental involvement and responsibility are promoted and information is provided on the parent's ability to meet the needs of the child. The assessment also identifies relatives and their resources for support, placement and possible permanency. The family assessment is conducted by an assessor with at least a Master's level degree in the social services field. The assessment includes two family centered approaches to engaging and encouraging participation for the child and family.

***Family Team Meeting:** A structured meeting in which the family works with service providers to develop a plan for safety, change and progress.

***Multi-Disciplinary Team Meeting:** This is the final stage of the assessment process in which the family, DFCS and other service providers are brought together to explore options for the family, discuss recommendations about placement and service interventions.

Psychological/ Developmental Assessment: Children (ages 4-18) are required to have a psychological evaluation when they first enter care. Infants and toddlers (ages 0-3) are required to have a developmental evaluation. The evaluations will provide useful information and recommendations for coordinating services for the child and permanency planning.

Educational Assessment: The educational component is a comprehensive assessment of the child's educational history prior to placement in foster care.

Medical Assessment: A comprehensive assessment of the child's overall health status. All children entering foster care will have a Health Check which includes periodic screening, vision, dental, and hearing services.

Adolescent Assessment: This component is designed to provide critical information to successfully transition young people from foster care to self-sufficiency. Adolescents, ages 14-18, will be administered the adolescent assessment if it is necessary or appropriate to assist in the youth's transition plan to permanency.



Relative Home Evaluations: Relatives are identified to care for the child/ren until the family recovers. A thorough relative home evaluation is conducted to determine the availability of someone with whom the child may know and feel comfortable. Relatives are the #1 desirable placement for children in foster care. The overall goal is to provide consistent, caring support for the child.
